

## ECONOMIC RECOVERY PROPOSALS

As of February 13, 2009

On February 13, the Conferenced version of the bill passed the House 246-183, with seven Democrats opposing passage and one voting "present"; no Republicans voted in favor of the bill. Later that same day, the Senate passed the Conferenced version of the bill 60-38; again with three Republicans voting in favor and no Democrats voting against.

The Conference Report on HR 1 provides a total of \$463 billion in spending for transportation, infrastructure, health care programs, education assistance, housing assistance and energy efficiency upgrades, and provides \$326 billion in personal and business tax breaks and tax provisions affecting payments to the states — for total of \$789 billion in spending and tax cuts.
